Some ideas for you to help your child develop

We know that the task of raising up a child can be challenging in the modern society. But it is equally a huge privilege we have in our hands. Here are some ideas to help you during this holiday.

Show unconditional love

Show your child love through affectionate gestures such as hugs, praises, and acknowledgments of their success

Create a safe and loving home

Do your best to provide proper nutrition for your child and encourage them to exercise and get sufficient sleep.

Encourage play

Encourage outdoor play that uses large muscles, like running, jumping, and climbing. Limit screen time to one or two hours per day. More activity is engaging and healthy for your child.

Read to your child

Reading to your child builds language skills. Point to pictures in the book and ask questions about the story. Find appropriate materials that have pictures and read together.

Use every day experiences as learning opportunities

Narrate what you are doing to stimulate language. For example, count and sort laundry to teach math. Play with food ingredients and textures to promote scientific thinking.

Foster a sense of belonging and self-worth

Teach your child skills like self-control, cooperation, and taking the perspective of others.

Create a conducive learning environment

Be positive, emotionally present, and reassuring when they fail. An environment of love and openness that allows children to fail and learn and be confident.

Communicate effectively

Talk to the child and hear what they have to say before jumping to conclusions. In every conversation, make sure you think from your child's perspective and let them express themselves. Positive feedback is always better than negative punishment or blames.
